Medicine bottles for Haiti follow CPC's bottle challenge

Labor Day is upon us, so it's time to turn in your bottles, if you haven't already done so, for the Crisis Pregnancy Center Father's Day to Labor Day challenge. A big thank you to all of you who took the time and money to contribute to families in crisis.

A new challenge of bottle-filling is afoot now. Read below to hear from Daniel Wilson about how you can help.

"After much thought and prayer, we are finally seeing a return to Haiti as a reality. Members of Purdue Pharmacy Christian Student Association are making plans to complete a very extensive project. With a goal of December 2011, we are trying to build and supply a new pharmacy at Lifeline Christian Mission in the community of Grand Goave, Haiti. Once we arrive, we will serve in the clinic and educate the

Haitians about proper use of their medications. Since Lifeline has struggled to rebuild from the earthquake, we are trying to provide this with no cost to Lifeline. Although we still have a lot of work to do, we are asking people to consider helping us reach our goal in a very simple way. When you finish your medications, save your prescription vials. When you get some loose change, put it in the vial and save it. You can bring them into church, and all the money will go directly to the new pharmacy. If you do not have prescriptions, you can use any small container or medicine

bottle. The vials can be washed and used in Haiti to dispense medications.

"I realize that many people do not share my passion for pharmacy, but I do believe that this is important. We have the opportunity to use what we have to serve people who are lost. Look at the gospels. People usually did not pursue Jesus because he was the Son of God. They went to him because they were sick or in need, and left with so much more than physical healing. At Lifeline, people come to the clinic because they are not physically well, but I have seen how their lives can change. That is a mission I want to support."
